

DEACON LUCIO'S HOMILY HOMEWORK

What is a Good Shepherd?



I bet we all remember that terrible shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary school in 2012, killing 20 children and 6 educators. Hard to believe that was already

some twelve years ago. There was a news report the day after about a teacher, Victoria Soto, which I never forgot and kept a copy of. It read:

Teacher Victoria Soto gave her life shielding her children from gunman in Newtown school shooting...

Victoria Soto, 27, a first grade teacher at Sandy Hook elementary school, shielded children and ushered them into a closet - putting her body between them and the gunman in Friday's tragic senseless shooting. Soto, who taught at the school for five years, was living her "life's dream," her cousin said. "She sacrificed herself to save her students. "You have a teacher who cared more about her students than her own life," Mayor John Harkins of Soto's hometown said. "That speaks volumes to her character & dedication."

For me personally, Victoria was no mere paid worker, nor even a good brave teacher; she was truly a *good shepherd* who literally *laid down her life* for her young sheep. This story came back to my mind as I read this weekend's gospel about Jesus, the Good Shepherd who laid down His life for us, His sheep. In fact, one of the earliest artistic depictions of Jesus, found in a Roman catacomb, shows Him carrying a sheep over his shoulders; Jesus the Good Shepherd!

We often speak of this Fourth Sunday of Easter as *Good Shepherd Sunday*. Twice in today's gospel, we hear Jesus say: I *am the Good Shepherd*; and repeated five times is what makes Jesus a Good Shepherd - *the laying down of His life*. We mustn't forget where and how the Risen Christ most showed *that love the Father has bestowed on us*, we heard in our First Reading - It was on Good Friday, as Jesus laid down His life for you and me upon the Cross!

Like Victoria Soto who sacrificed herself for the sake of her students and shielded them from the gunfire, Christ our Good Shepherd has shielded us from the forever effects of sin, evil, and death itself. As Peter proclaimed in our First Reading from Acts, this Jesus, *the stone rejected by the builders, has become the cornerstone of salvation given to the whole human race.*

Jesus is the Good Shepherd and we are His faithful sheep. But we are also called to be *Good Shepherds* - in our families as parents and spouses, at work, within the church, and as citizens. Just what does this look like? Pope Francis helps us with an answer here. So, for your homily homework this week, I'd like you to reflect on the following quotes from him and how they might apply to your life...

"We must not forget that true power, at whatever level, is service, which has its luminous summit on the Cross. God's authority is always synonymous with service, humility, love, foot washing"

"To pastors and church leaders I say - Be shepherds who take on the smell of the sheep. Support and stand by your people every step of the way, no matter how difficult or lengthy."

"To parish communities - Get in-volved by word and deed in people's daily lives. For how else can you be followers of the Good Shepherd if you do not personally engage in works of mercy - tending the sick, the poor, the dying, and the destitute? I thank you for being close to the suffering, offering them the loving presence of their shepherd."

"To political leaders - Yours is a noble vocation of leading and shepherding people, so govern us well. Bring our nations and world forward to achieve peace and the common good. Ensure for all citizens dignified work, education, and healthcare. Foster economic development for everyone, prosperity with equity! And do not forget your responsibility to the frail, weak, and vulnerable."

"Above all, I ask government leaders and citizens to find creative solutions to the plight of millions of migrants displaced by force, violence, or poverty. Protect their dignity, for these are men, women, and children like us! Hungry, scared, persecuted, wounded, exploited, victims of wars they are like scattered sheep without shepherd or pasture."

The above words from Pope Francis says it all. So let us, on this Good Shepherd Sunday, commit ourselves to follow Christ our Shepherd more closely, imitate Him in shepherding those entrusted to our care, and challenge our local, national, world leaders to be the kind of shepherds Pope Francis speaks of – that our divided and broken world might become *one flock* healed of all divisions.
