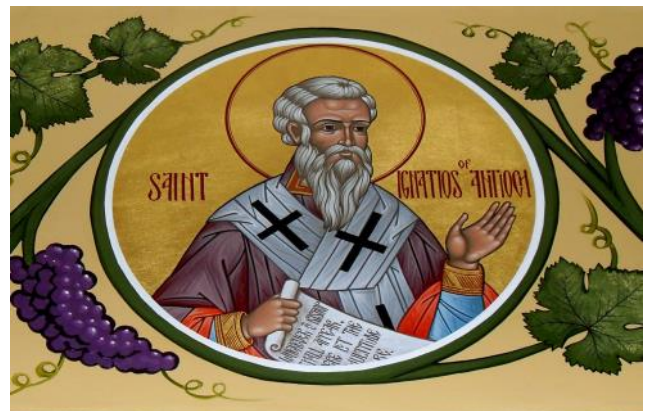

Deacon Lucio's Homily Homework *Fighting fire with fire!*



Fire! It's filled with contradictions. Think about it! Fire can provide light and warmth, but it can also destroy acres of forests and consume homes in its path. Fire can cook food and roast marshmallows, but also cause severe burns and lifelong scars. Nowhere is this contradiction more apparent than when firefighters battle an out of control wildfire, and literally "*fight fire with fire!*" They deliberately set a "*backfire*" in the path of the oncoming fire. As the backfire burns, it consumes dry tinder and deprives the primary fire of fuel... stops the wildfire in its tracks... confines it... making it easier to contain. Fire that takes lives and burns down homes can be used to save lives and property.

In today's gospel, John the Baptist appears and *prepares the way* for One who will *fight fire with fire!* While John calls for repentance with his own fire and brimstone preaching, he'll take second place to *the mightier One coming after him, who will baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire!* It is Jesus who ignites the *slow burn of God's Reign* in human history. Early on in His public ministry, we hear Jesus say: *I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing!* Jesus sets out "to fight fire with fire"! How so?

His words of merciful forgiveness with deeds of healing and freeing those held hostage by evil acted like a *backfire* - depriving sin, disease, and evil of their fuel; *stopping these in their tracks*. But it was on the *tinder wood of the cross* that Christ's burning love for us all would deprive sin, evil, and death itself of their lasting fuel and power. From the cross, Jesus' non-violent forgiving response was such a powerful *backfire* that it contained the relentless spread of those wildfires of hatred and vengeance.

So, why does it seem like the wildfires of injustice and evils in our world are only getting worse? Take the brutality of the war in Ukraine, which is just one of many conflicts in our troubled world! Well, in the mystery of God's saving plan, Christ entrusts to you and me the completion of His fire-fighting work. At our baptism, we were given a flame from the Easter candle, a *baptismal backfire*. Yes, we do believe Christ has ultimately contained the fires of sin and evil, but He wants you and me, His Church, to finish the job. How, we might ask?

First, we must allow the baptismal fire of Christ and His Spirit to come and burn away within us the chaff of any sins, violence, or hatreds that reside there. So, as part of your homily homework, make time this busy Advent season for some daily quiet prayer, allowing the mercy of Christ and power of the Holy Spirit to do its purifying work within. The Sacrament of Penance is one good way to stoke that inner fire.

Second, the flame of Christ given at our baptism sends us forth, like firefighters, to fight the blazes of injustices that affect the life and dignity of so many in our community and world. We do this by healing divisions and peacemaking, and through serving, and speaking out for, the most vulnerable and poor in our midst. Such efforts become the *backfires* to deprive the wildfires of division, war, and poverty of their fuel and power.

So for the next part of your homily homework, ask God to show you where you can bring some peace and help heal divisions in your little part of the world. Where might God want you to become involved to make a difference in the lives of those struggling to just put food on the table?

United with Christ, our Chief Fire Fighter, may our efforts this Advent help bring Isaiah's vision of a *Peaceable Kingdom* closer to reality so that *the calf and young lion, the wolf and lamb, oppressed and oppressor, Palestinian and Israeli, Ukrainian and Russian, West and East Louisville might become neighbors and inflict no harm or ruin on each other.*—*Deacon Lucio*

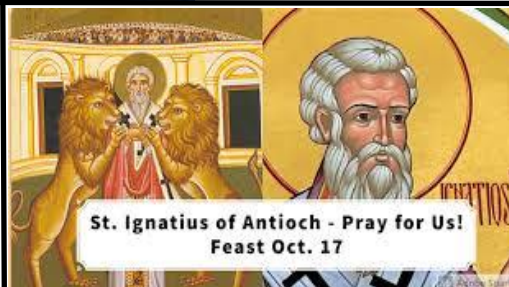
